### NOTES

In 1903 the plant was sold to the Cook Pottery Co. and became known as Cook's Prospect Hill Pottery. In 1932 the Cook Ceramic Co., a recent incorporation of the Cook Pottery Co. and the Ceramic Allied Products, Inc. purchased the New Brunswick Manufacturing Division of the Circle F Manufacturing Co. and moved to the Prospect Hill site and manufactured Circle F's porcelain requirements (Abramson and Karschner 1978:13).
